Re: Proposed 2024 Budget Timeline

### **Overview:**

To recommend a revised budget timeline for the upcoming fiscal year, fiscal year ending December 31, 2024. The proposed timeline deviates from our historical budgeting schedule and this memo will help explain the rationale behind this recommendation.

### **Proposed Budget Timeline:**

Capital Budget Review: November 14, 2023 Operating Budget Review: November 15, 2023

Consolidated Budget Ratification: November 21, 2023

### Rationale:

In recent years, we have traditionally reviewed and ratified our budgets in the first quarter of the proceeding year, with the 2023 capital budget and operating budget being ratified on March 22, 2023. However, this year, we propose starting the budgeting process much earlier for several reasons:

**Improved Fiscal Year Planning:** By initiating the budgeting process earlier, we aim to improve our ability to plan for the upcoming fiscal year effectively. This proactive approach will prevent us from going three months into the fiscal year without an approved budget, ensuring that we have the necessary authorization to spend operating budget amounts from day one.

**Early Procurement and Capital Planning:** Commencing the budget process ahead of schedule allows us to kickstart the procurement and capital planning processes earlier in the year. This, in turn, can lead to more efficient and strategic allocation of resources.

**Reduced Overlap with Year-End Obligations:** By separating the budgeting process from our year-end and reporting obligations, we can dedicate more attention and resources to completing our 2023 year-end tasks without the added complexity of simultaneous budget preparations. This will aid in ensuring that the Township is able to meet its reporting deadlines surrounding the 2023 fiscal in a timely manner.

### **Challenges**

While there are distinct advantages to starting the budget process earlier, there are also some disadvantages:

**Reliance on Projections:** Since the 2023 fiscal year is not yet complete, we will need to rely on projections to estimate year-end figures. This is necessary to obtain comparable data for setting the budget. Management has reviewed these projections to ensure they are as accurate as possible and will aim to reflect the actual year-end figures.

**Total Tax Percentage Impact:** We anticipate that the Region will not have its budget prepared until approximately February of 2024, which means we will not have access to the total tax percentage impact on Wainfleet residents until that time.

### **Conclusion:**

Despite these challenges, we believe that the benefits of adopting an early budget timeline significantly outweigh the drawbacks. This proactive approach will enhance our planning, streamline our processes, and ultimately lead to better financial management for the Township of Wainfleet.

We look forward to discussing this proposed budget timeline further and welcome any feedback or suggestions from the council. Thank you for your attention to this matter.

### **RECOMMENDATION(S):**

**THAT** Drainage Staff Report DSR-011/2023 respecting the Newhouse Drain be received; and

**THAT** staff be directed to advance the Newhouse Drain Engineer's Report for Consideration at the November 1, 2023 Council Meeting as per the timelines outlined in Section 41, Chapter D. 17 of the *Drainage Act* R.S.O. 1990.

### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

In May 2022 Council received a petition submitted under Section 4 of the Drainage Act to formalize an existing private ditch in the area of Highway 3, Perry Road and Wills Road as a municipal drain. The engineer has filed the final report for the Newhouse Drain with the Township.

The purpose of this report is to provide Council with an update on the Engineer's Report and requisite actions pertaining to the Meeting to Consider.

Through Council Resolution C-2022-084 Spriet Associates were appointed to undertake the drainage project.

### **BACKGROUND:**

On May 10, 2022, through Resolution No. C-084-2022, Council appointed Spriet Associates Ltd. to prepare a Section 4 engineering report for the Newhouse Drain. This appointment was in response to a petition submitted by property owners in the Area of Highway 3, Perry Road and Wills Road to formalize an existing private ditch as a municipal drain.

The on-site meeting was held July 5, 2022 and a follow up meeting with landowners and survey/engineering work continued through the summer and fall of 2022. A preliminary meeting was held August 15, 2023, to discuss the proposed design with property owners. Following the preliminary meeting, the engineer updated the proposed design and submitted the report to the Township.

The final report was filed with the Township on September 14, 2023. The Meeting to Consider provides property owners with an opportunity to ask questions of the engineer or express any concerns over the Engineer's Report related to design or any gross errors.

### **OPTIONS/DISCUSSION:**

- 1. Staff be directed to advance the Newhouse Drain Engineer's Report for Consideration at the November 1, 2023 Council Meeting as per the timelines outlined in Section 41, Chapter D. 17 of the *Drainage Act* R.S.O. 1990.
- 2. Do not move forward with the Engineer's Report (not recommended).

### FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

If approved by Council, the Township will be required to carry the costs of the project until the report is completed and the costs are allocated to the appropriate property owners in accordance with the engineer's report prepared pursuant to the *Drainage Act, R.S.O. 1990*. The estimated costs assessed to the Township for this proposed project total \$1,674 for drainage on Perry and Wills Road.

As per the *Drainage Act, R.S.O. 1990*, final actual costs to the Township will only be those assessed to the roads and lands of the Township identified in the engineer's report for any maintenance or improvements completed on the drain as outlined in the Section 4 report. A Section 4 engineering report is 100% billable and eligible for grant from OMAFRA.

To the Mayor and Council of the Township of Wainfleet

Mayor and Council:

We are pleased to present our report on the construction of the Newhouse Municipal Drain serving parts of Lots 29 to 31, Concessions 4 and 5, in the Township of Wainfleet.

### **AUTHORIZATION**

This report was prepared pursuant to Section 4 of the Drainage Act. Instructions were received from your Municipality with respect to a motion of Council. The work was initiated by a petition signed by the owners whose lands contain over 60 percent of the area requiring drainage.

### **DRAINAGE AREA**

The total watershed area as described above contains approximately 45.6 hectares. The area requiring drainage for the Newhouse Drain is described as the lands on the south side of Highway No. 3 in Lot 29, Concession 4.

### **HISTORY**

This drain is tributary to the Big Forks Drain which was last constructed pursuant to a report submitted by J.B. Wiebe, P. Eng., dated July 13, 1984. The drain is bound by the East Kelly Drain to the south and east and bound by the McCallum Drain to the west.

### **EXISTING DRAINAGE CONDITIONS**

A site meeting was held with respect to the project and through later discussions the owners reported the following:

• that the area is currently served by a private ditch across the property of H. Lammers (Roll No. 11-068) and roadside ditching along Highway No. 3



### **EXISTING DRAINAGE CONDITIONS**

• that the owner, Newhouse Onions Ltd. (Roll No. 9-085-01), indicated that they would like to secure a legal outlet for their lands on the south side of Highway No. 3

A field investigation and survey were completed. Upon reviewing our findings we note the following:

- that this area is currently served by a private open drain which could be improved to a municipal drain in the lands of H. Lammers (Roll No. 11-068)
- that the existing culvert under Highway No. 3 is in poor condition and requires replacement
- that the area west of Perry Road and Wills Road all drain east towards the intersection at Highway No. 3
- that the existing road ditch on the south side of the Highway No. 3 between Wills Road and the existing 1200mm diameter C.S.P. could be improved as a municipal drain to provide an improved outlet for the intersection and abutting lands.

Preliminary design, cost estimates and assessments were prepared, and an informal public meeting was held August 15, 2023 to review the findings and preliminary proposals. Further input and requests were provided by the affected owners at that time and at later dates. Based on the proposed design it was decided to proceed with the report.

### **DESIGN CONSIDERATIONS**

The Drainage Coefficient method contained in the "DRAINAGE GUIDE FOR ONTARIO", Publication 29 by the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food, and Rural Affairs (OMAFRA) is typically used to design municipal drains.

The proposed design and report have been generally completed using the "GUIDE FOR ENGINEERS WORKING UNDER THE DRAINAGE ACT IN ONTARIO" OMAFRA Publication 852.

### **RECOMMENDATIONS**

We are therefore recommending the following:

- that the existing private open drain be improved from the Big Forks Drain in the lands of H. Lammers (Roll No. 11-068) and head south towards the lands of J. & H. Odreman (Roll No. 11-069), then south across Highway No. 3, then head west in the road allowance towards the intersection of Wills Road for a total length of 430 lineal meters
- that the existing culvert under Highway No. 3 is in poor condition and requires replacement by the Road Authority. When it is replaced it should be deepened to provide adequate free board for the upstream tiles
- that in the lands of H. Lammers (Roll No. 11-068) restoration shall be to original conditions and care taken to preserve the large trees on their lands.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

• that the work in the road allowance be completed from the roadway and that excavated material be hauled away and disposed of.

### ENVIRONMENTAL CONSIDERATIONS AND MITIGATION MEASURES

There are no significant wetlands or sensitive areas within the affected watershed area or along the route of the drains.

This project has been reviewed by the Fisheries Protection Program & Oceans Canada, File Number (22-HCAA-01829) and they recommended the following be incorporated into the project in their letter of advice dated June 29, 2023:

- plan in-water work, undertaking, or activity to respect timing windows (i.e., no in-water work between March 15 - July 15 of any given year)
- develop and implement an Erosion and Sediment Control Plan to avoid the introduction of sediment into any waterbody during all phases of work.

### SUMMARY OF PROPOSED WORK

The proposed work consists of approximately 430 lineal meters of open ditch reconstruction and incorporation including bank seeding and sediment basins.

### **SCHEDULES**

Four schedules are attached hereto and form part of this report, being Schedule 'A' - Allowances, Schedule 'B' - Cost Estimate, Schedule 'C' - Assessment for Construction, and Schedule 'D' - Assessment for Maintenance.

Schedule 'A' - Allowances. In accordance with Sections 29 and 30 of the Drainage Act, allowances are provided for right-of-way and damages to lands and crops along the route of the drain as defined below.

Schedule 'B' - Cost Estimate. This schedule provides for a detailed cost estimate of the proposed work which is in the amount of \$32,000.00. This estimate includes engineering and administrative costs associated with this project.

Schedule 'C' - Assessment for Construction. This schedule outlines the distribution of the total estimated cost of construction over the roads and lands which are involved.

Schedule 'D' - Assessment for Maintenance. In accordance with Section 38 of the Drainage Act, this schedule outlines the distribution of future repair and/or maintenance costs for portions of, or the entire drainage works.

Drawing No. 1 Job No. 222146 and specifications form part of this report. They show and describe in detail the location and extent of the work to be done and the lands which are affected.



### **ALLOWANCES**

**DAMAGES**: Section 30 of the Drainage Act provides for the compensation to landowners along the drain for damages to lands and crops caused by the construction of the drain. The amount granted is based on \$4,6470.00/ha. for open ditch work with excavated material. This base rate is multiplied by the hectares derived from the working widths shown on the plans and the applicable lengths.

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**RIGHT-OF-WAY** Section 29 of the Drainage Act provides for an allowance to the owners whose land must be used for the construction, repair, or future maintenance of a drainage works.

For open ditches, the allowance provides for the loss of land due to the construction provided for in the report. The amounts granted are based on the value of the land, and the rate used was \$33,360.00/ha. When any buffer strip is incorporated and/or created, the allowance granted is for any land beyond a 1.8-meter width deemed to have always been part of the drain

### ASSESSMENT DEFINITIONS

In accordance with the Drainage Act, lands that make use of a drainage works are liable for assessment for part of the cost of constructing and maintaining the system. These liabilities are known as benefit, outlet liability and special benefit liability as set out under Sections 22, 23, 24 and 26 of the Act.

**BENEFIT** as defined in the Drainage Act means the advantages to any lands, roads, buildings or other structures from the construction, improvement, repair, or maintenance of a drainage works such as will result in a higher market value or increased crop production or improved appearance or better control of surface or sub-surface water, or any other advantages relating to the betterment of lands, roads, buildings, or other structures.

**OUTLET** liability is assessed to lands or roads that may make use of a drainage works as an outlet either directly or indirectly through the medium of any other drainage works or of a swale, ravine, creek, or watercourse.

In addition, a Public Utility or Road Authority shall be assessed for and pay all the increased cost to a drainage works due to the construction and operation of the Public Utility or Road Authority. This may be shown as either benefit or special assessment.

### **ASSESSMENT**

A modified "Todgham Method" was used to calculate the assessments shown on Schedule 'C'- Assessment for Construction. This entailed breaking down the costs of the drain into sections along its route. Special Assessments were then extracted from each section.

The remainder is then separated into Benefit and Outlet costs. The Benefit cost is distributed to those properties receiving benefit as defined under "Assessment Definitions", with such properties usually being located along or close to the route of the drain.



### **ASSESSMENT** (cont'd)

The Outlet Costs are distributed to all properties within the watershed area of that section on an adjusted basis. The areas are adjusted for location along that section, and relative run-off rates. Due to their different relative run-off rates, forested lands have been assessed for outlet at lower rates than cleared lands. Also, roads, residential properties, greenhouses have been assessed for outlet at higher rates than cleared farmlands.

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The actual cost of the work involving this report is to be assessed on a pro-rata basis against the lands and roads liable for assessment for benefit and outlet as shown in detail below and on Schedule 'C' - Assessment for Construction.

### SPECIAL ASSESSMENT

If any additional work is required to the drainage works due to the existence of buried utilities such as gas pipelines, communications cables, etc. or if any of the utilities require relocation or repair, then, the extra costs incurred shall be borne by the utility involved in accordance with the provisions of Section 26 of the Drainage Act.

### **GRANTS**

In accordance with the provisions of Section 85 of the Drainage Act, a grant **may** be available for assessments against privately owned parcels of land which are used for agricultural purposes and eligible for the Farm Property Class Tax rate. Section 88 of the Drainage Act directs the Municipality to make application for this rant upon certification of completion of this drain. The Municipality will then deduct the grant from the assessments prior to collecting the final assessments.

### **MAINTENANCE**

Upon completion of construction, all owners are hereby made aware of Sections 80 and 82 of the Drainage Act which forbid the obstruction of or damage or injury to a municipal drain.

After completion the entire Newhouse Drain shall be maintained by the Township of Wainfleet at the expense of all upstream lands and roads assessed in Schedule 'D' - Assessment for Maintenance and in the same relative proportions until such time as the assessment is changed under the Drainage Act.





### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

The purpose of this report is to seek Council direction regarding the establishment of a 2024 Council meeting schedule and to consider related housekeeping changes to Council's Procedure By-law.

### **BACKGROUND:**

According to the Township's Procedural By-law, Council meetings are to be scheduled every third Tuesday beginning at 7:00 p.m. in accordance with the Council meeting schedule prepared by the Clerk and approved by Council resolution, unless Council, by resolution, directs otherwise.

Tuesday, January 2<sup>nd</sup> is the first day back from Christmas holidays in 2024, and therefore, staff recommend the first meeting in 2024 be held the following Tuesday, January 9, 2024.

A review of the Procedure By-law has been undertaken to potentially identify and accommodate scheduling conflicts, including conflicts with statutory holidays and other events of important corporate impact (for example, significant municipally-related events such as the Association of Municipalities of Ontario Conference and Rural Ontario Municipal Association Conference).

To accommodate vacations, staff propose having a summer recess and having one meeting in July and taking the month of August off. This will allow for Council Members and Staff to plan ahead with vacation schedules in the summer months.

If Council supports the adoption of the proposed schedule, Members should be aware that special meetings of Council may be required to be called from time to time if urgent business arises requiring Council's attention.

Staff propose a Special Capital Budget Meeting to be held on November 25, 2024; a Special Operating Budget Meeting to be held on November 27, 2024; and would propose consideration of the final budget at the Regular Council meeting on December 3, 2024.

Finally, staff would propose, for Council's consideration, an amendment to the start time of meetings of Council from 7:00 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. Council meetings often involve lengthy discussions and decision-making processes. By starting earlier, members can be more alert and focused, potentially leading to more efficient use of time. Further, when meetings run late, Council members may feel rushed to make decisions, potentially leading to suboptimal outcomes. Starting earlier can callow for more thorough deliberation.

### FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

Although there are costs associated with the conduct of Council meetings (staff time, streaming costs, etc.), there are no direct financial implications related to the establishment of a 2024 Meeting Schedule.

Motion - Recommendations from the Renfrew County Inquest and Declaration of Intimate Partner Violence as an Epidemic and Declaration of Intimate Partner Violence as an Epidemic

Regional Council, at its meeting held on September 21, 2023, passed the following recommendation:

WHEREAS the jury that adjudicated the Carol Culleton, Anastasia Kuzyk, and Nathalie Warmerdam Inquest (The Renfrew County Inquest) issued 86 recommendations to the Province of Ontario on Intimate Partner Violence;

WHEREAS Recommendation #1 of the Inquest is for the Province of Ontario to declare Intimate Partner Violence an epidemic;

WHEREAS every six days in Canada a woman is killed by her intimate partner;

WHEREAS on any given night in Canada, more than 6,000 women and children sleep in shelters because it is not safe for them at home:

WHEREAS this past year in Ontario, 52 women or one every week, were victims of femicide;

WHEREAS violence against Indigenous women (including but not restricted to intimate partner violence) is a national crisis, as evidenced by the findings of the National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls, with Indigenous women (61%) experiencing some form of intimate partner violence in their lifetime compared with non-Indigenous women (44%);

WHEREAS gender- and sexually-diverse Indigenous women are particularly at risk, being five times more likely than non-Indigenous gender- and sexually-diverse women to experience intimate partner violence in their lifetime;

WHEREAS in Niagara Region in 2022, there were 5,160 Intimate Partner Violence calls for service made to Niagara Regional Police Service and 1,143 of those calls involved criminal investigations:

WHEREAS for the 2022-2023 fiscal year, Victim Services Niagara provided service to 749 victims of intimate partner violence, including 31 children; developed 91 safety plans for victims and had to revise 55 of those safety plans due to breaches;

WHEREAS for the 2022-2023 fiscal year, Victim Services Niagara provided service to 227 victims of sexual violence;

WHEREAS for the 2022-2023 fiscal year, Birchway Niagara received 2,571 crisis calls; supported 575 women through outreach services; 233 women and children stayed in shelter; and 278 women were turned away due to a lack of space;

WHEREAS for the 2022-2023 fiscal year, Gillian's Place received 10,383 crisis calls; supported 2,017 people through outreach services; 166 adults and 127 children lived in shelter; and 431 people were turned away due to lack of space;

WHEREAS violence against women costs the national justice system, health care systems, social service agencies, and municipalities nearly \$10 billion dollars per year; and municipalities are on the front lines in addressing gender-based violence;

WHEREAS more than 40 municipalities and regions across Ontario have declared a gender-based violence and/or intimate partner violence epidemic:

WHEREAS on August 16, 2023, Justice Minister Arif Virani described gender-based violence as an epidemic and stated this his government is committed to ending the gender-based violence epidemic "in all its forms, and is working to address any gaps in the Criminal Code to ensure a robust justice system response;"

WHEREAS on August 20, 2023, Ontario Big City Mayors (OBCM) and Mayors and Regional Chairs of Ontario (MARCO) passed a motion declaring intimate partner violence and gender-based violence epidemic; called on the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM), the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO), and all municipalities and regions in Ontario and Canada to do the same; and called for changes to the Criminal Code; and

WHEREAS Niagara Regional Council recognizes that issues of gender-based violence and intimate partner violence are matters of local importance, including public health, EMS, community services, and community safety, in all of our communities.

### NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

- 1. That Niagara Region **RECOGNIZE** the issues of gender-based violence and intimate partner violence in Niagara as serious to the health and wellness of local residents and their families:
- That Niagara Region COMMIT to engaging with community partners to educate and support our residents about the seriousness and long-term danger of violence in our communities;
- That Niagara Regional Council **DECLARE**, in accordance with Recommendation #1
  of the Renfrew County Inquest, that intimate partner violence and gender-based
  violence are an epidemic;

- 4. That the Regional Chair **WRITE** a letter to The Honourable Doug Ford, Premier of Ontario, requesting that the Province of Ontario re-consider their previous decision and declare intimate partner violence and gender-based violence as epidemic and act on all of 86 Recommendations from The Renfrew County Inquest;
- That a copy of this motion **BE SENT** to each of Niagara's 12 Local Area Municipalities requesting they endorse the declaration of intimate partner violence and gender-based violence as an epidemic; and
- 6. That a copy of this motion **BE SENT** to The Honourable Arif Virani, Minister of Justice; The Honourable Doug Ford, Premier of Ontario; The Honourable Charmaine A. Williams, Associate Minister of Women's Social and Economic Opportunity; The Honourable Parm Gill, Minister of Red Tape Reduction; Niagara four MPs; Niagara's four MPPs; the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO); the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM); Mayors and Regional Chairs of Ontario (MARCO); and Ontario's Big City Mayors (OBCM).

- 2. The Mayor and proper officials of the Corporation of the Township of Wainfleet are hereby authorized and directed to do all things necessary to give effect to the abovementioned actions and to obtain approvals where required.
- 3. Unless otherwise provided, the Mayor and Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to execute and the Clerk to affix the seal of the corporation of the Township of Wainfleet to all documents necessary to give effect to the above-mentioned actions.
- 4. This by-law shall come into force on the day upon which it is passed.
